New boreholes transform life in Kilifi

In the heart of Kilifi County, a region that once struggled with water scarcity is undergoing change thanks to the Baricho Replacement Boreholes Project. This initiative has brought hope and prosperity to thousands of residents. For decades, people in Baricho and nearby villages faced challenges in accessing clean and reliable water. Today, that story is changing, and so is the community's future. The Baricho Replacement Boreholes project, located in Baricho, Kilifi County, has become crucial for residents who no longer need to walk long distances to find water. The project now supports nearby villages, several primary schools, and even reaches towns as far as Malindi and Mombasa. For residents like Hesbon

Sulubu, the project has brought remarkable progress. Standing by one of the newly completed borehole sites, Sulubu reflected on the changes in his community. "We are now very happy as locals because water is available for our homes and even for agriculture," he said, smiling with pride. Sulubu remembered the difficult days when fetching water meant long, tiring walks and endless lines at seasonal rivers or shallow wells. Those days were filled with struggle and lost productivity, especially for women and children who bore the heaviest burden. "The problem of water shortages now seems to be gone," he added. "Many young people have found jobs since the project began in January, and this year has been good for earning an income." Families can now concentrate on their

livelihoods, and small-scale farmers have started using the water for irrigation, which boosts food security and local income levels. The project has not only satisfied the community's thirst but also created important job opportunities. Dozens of young people were employed during the drilling and construction phases, helping to reduce idleness among local youth. Titus Mwero, a foreman at the site and a local resident, feels fortunate to benefit from the project. "I got a job at the project, and being local means I also get to enjoy the available water," Mwero said. Local businesses, especially those that rely on water like construction, hospitality, and agriculture, are expected to thrive as accessing water becomes more affordable. For years, many businesses in Kilifi struggled to operate

due to inconsistent water supply and high transportation costs for hauling water from distant locations. Engineer Mario Formica from China Railway Number 10 Engineering Group Company Ltd., the contractor for the project, explained that it involved rehabilitating three boreholes and reinforcing gabion structures along the river. "There was a previous contractor, but last year's floods in May destroyed the structures, which was unfortunate for locals," Formica said. "We are now reinforcing the structure. The gabions will protect the infrastructure downstream." He added that the project, which started in January, is nearly finished, with only minor gabion work expected to be completed within a month. "As long as the boreholes keep working, water will be supplied to Malindi and Mombasa. Locals are very happy because the project is providing them with water and creating jobs," Formica noted. The Baricho Replacement Boreholes project includes three boreholes—numbered 1, 3, and 4—that were drilled,

equipped, and secured with fencing, a chlorination unit, and small storage tanks. Together, these three wells produce an impressive 90,000 cubic meters of water daily, serving around 36,000 people. The project is being implemented by the Government of Kenya (GoK) under the Water and Sanitation Development Project (WSDP), with funding support from the World Bank. It seeks to enhance water supply and sanitation services in selected coastal and north-eastern regions of the country, while improving the financial performance of Water Service Providers (WSPs) affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Each borehole has a modern submersible pump, a control panel, and a steel-cased wellhead, all designed for durability and efficiency. The CWWDA will monitor the sites for the next 12 months to ensure sustainability and optimal performance. There are plans to replicate this model in other underserved coastal areas. The Baricho project is part of the larger Water and Sanitation Development Project (WSDP), an initiative by the Kenyan government

supported by the World Bank. The WSDP aims to improve water and sanitation services in selected coastal and northeastern regions while strengthening the financial and operational performance of local Water Service Providers (WSPs). This project focuses on reducing non-revenue water, improving billing systems, and enhancing overall service delivery. It also includes a results-based financing mechanism that encourages WSPs to expand access and maintain efficiency. The project encompasses Kilifi, Mombasa, Kwale, Taita Taveta, Garissa, and Wajir Counties, collaborating with agencies like the Water Services Regulatory Board and the Water Sector Trust Fund. For the people of Baricho, the boreholes mean more than just water; they represent renewal. Children can now attend school regularly, farmers can grow their crops year-round, and local businesses can operate confidently. "It has truly brought a new lease on life," says Sulubu. "We no longer worry about where our next drop of water will come from. That is a blessing beyond words."

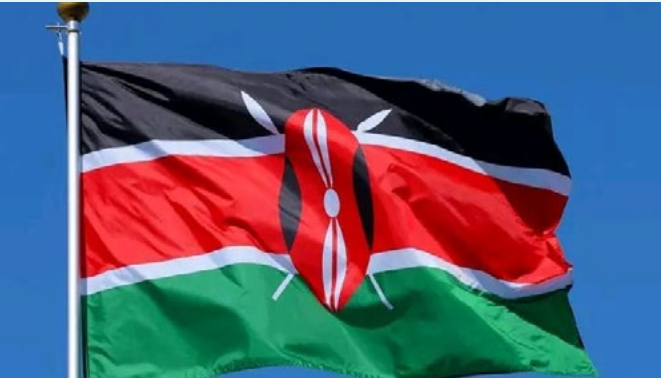

Mama Ngina Kenyatta honoured for women in security

Ushiriki Wema Honours Mama Ngina Kenyatta for Championing Women Inclusion in Security

The Ushiriki Wema Initiative has honoured former First Lady, Mama Ngina Kenyatta, for her pivotal role in advocating for the inclusion of women in the country's security services during the era of the late President Mzee Jomo Kenyatta.

The recognition was conferred during the annual "Staara ya Wazee" sporting event, held at the Ulinzi Complex grounds in Lang'ata, Nairobi.

The occasion was graced by Kristina Pratt, who represented her mother, Mama Ngina Kenyatta, as the chief guest.

Organized by Tessie Musalia, spouse of Prime Cabinet Secretary and Foreign Affairs CS Musalia Mudavadi, the event celebrated retired women in the security sector for their decades of service and dedication to national defense.

This year's theme, "Women in Security," spotlighted female veterans whose resilience, leadership, and courage opened doors for generations of women in Kenya's disciplined forces.

In her remarks, Ms. Pratt highlighted Mama Ngina's significant role in 1971, when she influenced a historic decision that opened the doors for women to be recruited into the army and police.

"It all began as a simple but powerful conversation between Mama Ngina and Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, an understanding that women, too, could defend their country," Pratt shared. "From that moment, the first women were recruited into the armed

forces and the police. They became the trailblazers of women in Kenya's security sector."

She paid tribute to the female veterans, describing them as "unsung heroes who broke barriers and proved that women can lead and serve with excellence."

Pratt also called for renewed government efforts towards improving welfare for retired women in uniform many of whom served without benefits or pensions.

"Some of these pioneers left service without medical cover or retirement support. These are issues that deserve recognition and redress," she said.

Several retired officers, including Major General Fatuma Ahmed, former Deputy Inspector General of Police Grace Kahindi, among other key former officers shared reflections on their times in service.

Major General Ahmed commended Ushiriki Wema for its efforts in recognizing women veterans and fostering solidarity among them.

"Our service may have ended, but our mission to build and inspire continues," she said.

Madam Kahindi recalled the early challenges of serving in male-dominated institutions but celebrated the progress achieved, noting, "We have moved this nation forward, and history will remember the women who first wore the uniform."

Ushiriki Wema's founder Tessie Musalia emphasized that the initiative seeks not only to celebrate but also to advocate for the welfare of senior citizens, especially women who served the nation.

She raised concern over the delayed Older Persons Bill, 2024, which aims to protect the elderly from abuse

and neglect, and to provide access to care and social opportunities.

"We urge Parliament to prioritize this legislation and ensure our elders live in dignity."

Major General Fatma Ahmed, Kenya's first female Air Force Commander, praised Ushiriki Wema for "rejuvenating the spirit of togetherness" among women veterans and urged them to give back to society through mentorship and community service.

"The wealth of knowledge and experience among our veterans is immense," she noted.

"We must find ways to use it for the common good."

Former DIG Kahindi also acknowledged the progress made since women were first allowed into the security forces, saying, "We have moved this nation, and in Kenya's history, a small chapter will always be written about us."

In her closing remarks, Kristina Pratt encouraged the veterans to form savings and credit cooperatives (SACCOs) as a means of empowerment.

Adding that, "Even in retirement, you still have strength, skills, and the spirit to work. With a little support, you can build sustainable livelihoods and continue contributing to your communities."

She also reminded participants that loneliness among the elderly is a growing health challenge. "When we keep busy, when we belong to a community, we stay healthy. That is the essence of Ushiriki Wema, unity in togetherness."

The "Staara ya Wazee" event is an annual celebration under the Ushiriki Wema Initiative, dedicated to honoring senior citizens and promoting their social and physical well-being.

Mombasa Youth Plant 1,500 Mangroves, Nearing 10,000 Goal

Members of the Dawoodi Bohra community in Mombasa successfully concluded another mangrove planting and clean-up drive today to help restore the region's vital coastal ecosystem. This latest effort saw students from the MSB Educational Institute plant 1,500 mangrove saplings, contributing to a larger community goal of planting 10,000 mangrove trees along the Kenyan coast.

The event was graced by Hon. Dr. Mbwari Kame, County Executive Committee Member for Education, along with the Area Chief and Assistant Chief, who expressed their support for the community's sustained environmental efforts.

This sustained program, carried under the banner of the global Project Rise initiative, aligns directly with the Government of Kenya's One Million Tree Campaign, reflecting a shared vision for a greener, sustainable future.

The recent planting activity continues the momentum built over the last few months, which saw the community plant 3,500 and 1,500 mangrove trees in collaboration with the Deputy Governor of Mombasa, Hon Francis Thoya and other local officials. The overall project is strategically designed to combat the effects of coastal erosion, enhance local biodiversity,



and raise awareness about the critical role of mangroves in mitigating climate change.

government authorities and local partners to undertake the 10,000 mangroves project."

He continued, "these environmental efforts by our community in Mombasa are a reflection of the teachings of our leader, His Holiness Syedna Mufaddal Saifuddin, who continues to stress the importance of protecting

the bounties of nature and encourages community members to undertake tree planting and cleanliness initiatives across the world."

The youth-led nature of the drive aims to instill a strong sense of environmental responsibility and service in students. Young Sarrah Hassan Namajee, a student from MSB

Educational Institute, shared, "Participating in the mangrove planting was a truly rewarding experience. Every sapling planted is an investment in the future of Mombasa's environment and our local fishing communities."

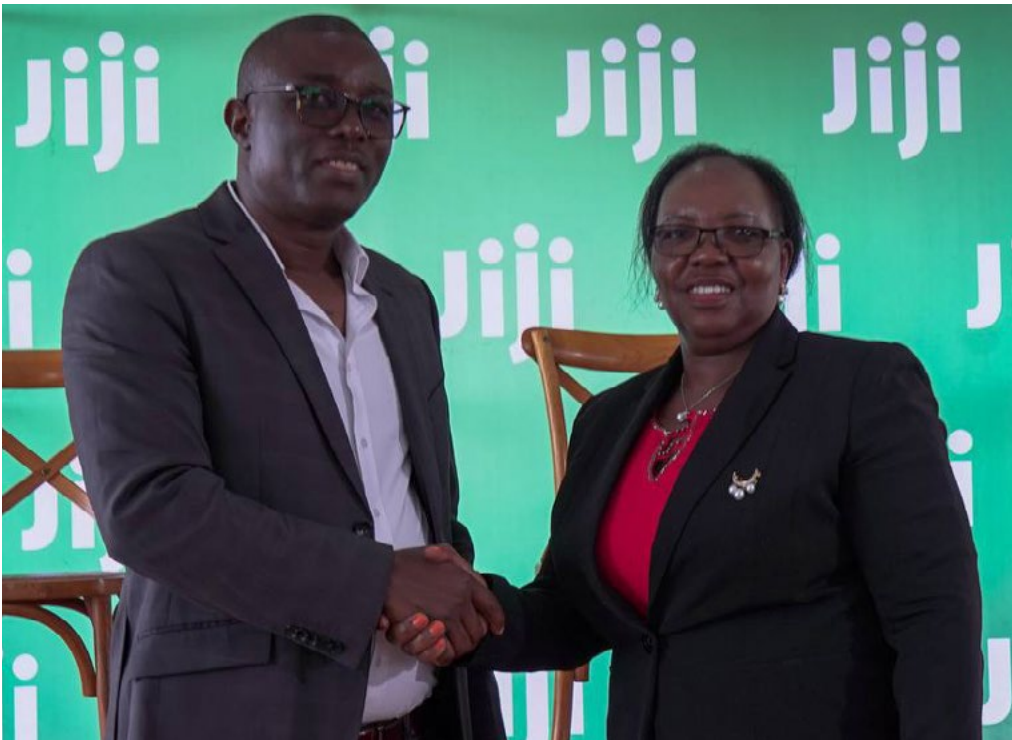

World Events

Cholera Outbreak Worsening Globally

The World Health Organization (WHO) reported a critical escalation of the global cholera outbreak. The number of deaths in 2025 has already exceeded the total for all of 2024. The Eastern Mediterranean and African regions are most severely impacted, with an urgent call for increased humanitarian aid and sanitation efforts to contain the disease's spread. The WHO is working with local governments to deploy resources and implement vaccination programs.

Engineered Therapeutics for Chronic Illness. Scientists are making significant strides in "engineered living therapeutics." This innovative approach involves programming microbes or cells to produce medicine directly inside the human body. Researchers believe this method could offer a more effective, long-term, and potentially cheaper solution for managing chronic conditions such as diabetes and inflammatory diseases. Clinical trials are currently underway for several potential applications, showing



promising early results.

OpenAI's Sora 2 Video Model Launch

OpenAI launched Sora 2, the latest version of its text-to-video generation model. The new iteration boasts enhanced realism, higher resolution, and the ability to generate longer, more complex video sequences (up to 60 seconds). While showcasing incredible technological advancement, the launch has intensified intellectual property debates, with several Hollywood studios and content creators expressing concerns over potential copyright infringement and the future of creative industries.

Apple Unveils M5 Chip

Apple updated its 14-inch MacBook Pro lineup with the new, powerful M5 chip. The company emphasized the chip's improved performance for demanding tasks, particularly in artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning workloads. The update also promises extended battery life for the professional-grade laptops. World News

Sudan Conflict: Over 60,000 people have fled the Sudanese city of El-Fasher after its capture by the RSF militia, who are accused of mass executions and crimes against humanity. The humanitarian situation is dire.

US Government Shutdown: The United States government experienced another shutdown due to an inability to pass spending bills. This resulted in thousands of federal employees being forced to take unpaid leave and affected benefits for millions of Americans.

Gaza Ceasefire Talks: High-stakes negotiations between Israeli and Hamas officials began in Egypt over a US-proposed peace plan. The plan includes a hostage exchange and potential Israeli withdrawal, but sticking points remain regarding future governance of Gaza.

Hurricane Melissa: A severe storm, Hurricane Melissa, battered the Caribbean,

Quantum Computing Focus: The U.S. government is considering direct investments in quantum computing firms to maintain national security leadership

amidst competition from other nations.

Emerging Technologies: The World Economic Forum highlighted top emerging technologies for 2025, including structural battery composites for lighter electric vehicles and autonomous biochemical sensors for real-time health monitoring.

Box Office Low: October box office revenue in North America fell to a 27-year low, excluding the pandemic years, due to a scarcity of new major releases.

Taylor Swift Concert Film: The theatrical release of Taylor Swift's concert film was a major entertainment moment for the month, demonstrating strong box-office performance with a \$33 million opening weekend.

New TV Season: Fall TV premieres crowded the calendars of streaming services and networks, with viewers deciding which platforms were worth keeping their subscriptions for.

But now I know many of us didn’t fail because we were dull.

We failed because the system made us believe we were nothing.

Sometimes, all a child needs is encouragement, not humiliation.

Zeros destroy confidence.

Mockery kills interest.

Once a student believes he’s useless, he stops trying.

Teachers, parents, lecturers let’s change this system.

Let’s stop tearing children down in the name of discipline.

Let’s start teaching with love, patience, and respect.

We can build a better Africa.

Because every child deserves a chance not shame.


